#### **Details of each activities**

#### 2.ab Teaching UG & PG

When we look at the present scenario of Indian Economy it is quite evident that India, being one of the emerging economies in the world slowly giving place to rapid economic activities and higher levels of income under the impact of globalization. Of course, in the era of globalization India is confronted with many critical challenges and issues. One such challenge is associated with higher education and related issues.

Apart from these constraints there has been a rapid change in the traditional academic spheres, introduction of private educational institution in our state has began to dominate which throws challenges to the rural and backward institutes like ours.

Therefore, students who are into higher education should be given training and entrepreneurial skills in such a way as to fulfill the growing industrial and market needs of present day competitive world. In this regard, universities and colleges should fulfill their needs while graduating the present generation students.

As far as quality of education is concerned, Mugberia Gangadhar Mahavidyalaya has carved a niche by enhancing with global skills and employability culture of students and is striving hard to impart quality education in various fields. Keeping in mind of the challenges the college has already implemented several programmes.

All though financial assistance is provided by the state govt., UGC and other organizations through development grants, the level of funding is still inadequate in relation to existing demand for the fund. Therefore, we need additional funds for the execution of the proposed activities mentioned in the action plan and budget of CPE application.

The institution, keeping in mind the growing needs of the market, has been striving hard to impart not only quality classroom teaching but also aims at promoting better research, better learning and development of entrepreneurial skills among staff and students.

It is worth noting that journey towards excellence isn't begun though we are ready to implement and execute the proposed task and activities framed in this application in an effective manner if sanctioned with necessary financial aid.

#### 2.ab.i Smart Class Room

We have started virtual class room facilities to meet the global requirements. Moreover we have started 03 smart class rooms and 01 language lab with all necessary equipments and tools in the Arts, science and B.P.Ed departments. We want to extend smart class rooms to other departments for their enrichments. Projectors, Printers, UPS, Software's and interactive boards have been procured for advanced teaching in the smart class rooms.

#### 2.ab.ii Enrichment of Departmental and Central Library

In order to meet the requirements of the students and faculty members, it is essential to extend the Libraries by procuring Peer Reviewed Journals, Periodicals and Books. It is also needed to upgrade the library system with WEB OPAC, RFID, and CCTV Surveillance for Open Access System.

#### 2.ab.iii Improvement of Laboratories with modern facilities

At present there are 09 Laboratories for Science and Physical Education departments and 01 computer lab for Commerce department active for general academic use. These laboratories have been equipped with modern facilities. However, the available modern equipments, apparatus are inadequate in relation to the student population of the college. In view of the above shortages the institution intends to install new equipments and apparatus for general science students and modern equipments for sports science students (B.P.Ed & M.P.Ed).

#### 2.ab.iv Establishment of Comprehensive Seminar/Conference Rooms.

More than 10 seminars inclusive of State Level and National Levels ware organized in the last three years for the benefits of teachers and students. Keeping in mind of the regularity and the recurrent visit of the eminent scientist and scholars to attend those seminars, it is necessary to cater modern facilities with the installation of Audio System with acoustic false ceiling, AC, wall paneling system for renovation to the existing structure.

#### 2.ab.v Enrichment of Gymnasium

The college gymnasium is well equipped. We are running both B.P.Ed & M.P.Ed courses. To meet the demand of the students, we want to modernize our gymnasium with latest indoor & outdoor sports lab with Skinfold Caliper, motion analyzer, camera with software, LCD Sony 24", Digital Spirometer, Digital Stadiometer etc.

#### 2.c Research

#### 2.c.i Enrichment of research lab

For betterment of research, well equipped research lab is very vital. It should be equipped and upgraded with latest software and necessary equipments. In this regard the institutional research cell aims to enrich the same by purchasing various instruments and software from the financial assistance of proposed CPE.

#### 2.c.ii Subscription of International journals

To carry out effective research, literature survey is necessary. For that purpose, the availability and accessibility of full version of research papers or articles published in international journals is important. To avail those facilities, the institution wants to subscribe some research journals both for science and arts streams through online.

#### 2.c.iii Execution of collaborative research programmes

Research based programmes like seminars; workshops on Research Methodology are being conducted periodically. Besides, International collaborative research programmes are targeted to be organized in a regular manner. With this increased facility in the institution, more number of students and staff will be motivated to take up research and field works in the appropriate areas. Due to all round effort on research activities few departments have already established collaborative research activities. Teachers of physics, Mathematics and Chemistry departments

have published their collaborative research papers in various high impact international journals.

#### 2.c.iv Publication of peer reviewed journals

To share our research findings with others and vice-versa, the institution aims to publish peer reviewed journals enriched with research findings and data collecting from the researchers and authors from the various part of the country and abroad. In this initiation, financial supports are needed which is planned to get under this proposed CPE scheme.

#### 2.c.v Awards or scholarship grants

The institution has also planned to inculcate research culture among both the student and faculty through financial assistance to be given to them as an incentive to undertake research based activities in an effective manner. Further, a good number of teachers who are carrying out their major / minor projects will be awarded for their research Excellencies.







- Register of Assets acquired wholly or substantially out of the grant shall be maintained by the University in the prescribed Performa

- 9. The grantee institution shall ensure the utilization of grants-in-aid for which it is being sanctioned / paid. In case of non-utilization/part utilization thereof, simple interest @ 10% per annum, as amended from time to time on the unutilized amount from thedate of drawl to the date of refund as per provisions contained in General Financial Rules of Govt. of India, will be
- 10. The University / Institution shall follow strictly the Government of India / UGC's guidelines regarding implementation of the reservation policy [both vertical (for SC, ST & OBC) and horizontal (for persons with disability etc.)] In teaching and non-teaching posts.
- The University / Institution shall fully implement the Official Language Policy of Union Government and comply with the Official Language Act, 1963 and Official Languages (Use for Official Purposes of the Union) Rules, 1976 etc.
- 12. The sanction is issued in exercise of the delegation of powers vide UGC Order No. 130/2013 (F.No. 10-11/12 (Admn. IA & B)] dated 28/5/2013.
- 13. The College /Institution shall strictly follow the UGC Regulations on curbing the menace of Ragging in Higher Education Institutions, 2009.
- 14. The College / Institution shall take immediate action for its accreditation by National Assessment & Accreditation Council (NAAC).
- 15. The accounts of the College/ Institution will be open for audit by the Comptroller & Auditor General of India in accordance with the provisions of General Financial Rules, 2005.
- 16. The annual accounts i.e. balance sheet, income and expenditure statement and statement of receipts and payments are to be prepared strictly in accordance with the Uniform Format of Accounting prescribed by Government.
- 17. Funds to the extent of Rs. 166500,00.00 Lakh are available under the scheme.




